First Reading: Proverbs 9:1-6

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:12-22, 24b-26

A reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians.

As the human body is one, but has many parts; and as all the parts of the body, though many, are one single body, so it is with the Christ. We were all baptized by one Spirit to form the one body of Christ, Judeans or Greeks, enslaved or free; and we were all given the one Spirit to drink; and the body of Christ is not made up of one part, but of many.

Now if the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I don't belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. If the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as God wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be?

There are many parts, but one body. The eye can't say to the hand, "I have no need of you!" And the head can't say to the feet, "I don't need you!" On the contrary, those parts of the body often deemed "weaker" are indispensable in the body of Christ...

God has put the body together, giving greater honor to the parts that were not given honor, so that there should be no division in the body, so that its parts should have equal concern for one another. Thus, if one part suffers, every part suffers. If one part is honored, all rejoice together with it.

Gospel: Luke 18:1-8

A Reading from the Gospel attributed to Luke. *Glory to You, O God.*

Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not lose heart.

He said: "In a certain city, there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. And there was a widow in that town who kept coming to the judge with the plea, 'Grant me justice against my adversary.'

"For some time, she was refused by the judge. But, finally, the judge thought, 'Even though I don't fear God or respect people, because this widow keeps bothering me, I will see that she gets justice, so that she won't eventually come and attack me!"

Jesus said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. Will not, then, God bring about justice for God's chosen ones, who cry out in prayer day and night? Will God keep putting them off? I tell you, they will get justice, and quickly. However, when the Chosen One comes, will anyone with faith be found on Earth?"
